Call for Workshop Proposals

About the Conference

The Wisconsin Aging and Disability Network
Conference is a statewide event focused on improving
the lives of older people and adults with disabilities.
Sponsored by the Wisconsin Department of Health

(BADR), this conference provides attendees numerous
opportunities to learn, network, and collaborate.
The audience includes, but is not limited to, those
who work and volunteer with statutory boards and
councils, aging and disability resource centers, county
and tribal aging units, human services departments,
senior centers, advocacy organizations, managed care
organizations, and disability services organizations.

Workshop Format

We encourage creative workshop formats that offer innovative methods of learning and new ideas. Workshops may have up to three presenters and will be **one hour and 15 minutes** long. Those requiring more time may request two back-to-back workshop sessions or a half- or full-day preconference intensive session on Wednesday, September 23. Each presenter will receive a complimentary one-day conference registration.

Workshop Selection Process

The conference planning committee will review all proposals and reserves the right to accept or reject any proposal. Notifications of acceptance or rejection will be made by April 15, 2020.

Proposal Content and Evaluation Scale

Workshop proposals must be <u>submitted online</u> by **April 10, 2020**.

Submissions will be evaluated based on the following point system:

General Description of Presentation 30 pts

This description is limited to 7,000 characters (approximately two pages) and must include:

- Summary—describe the content of the presentation.
- Format—will the session be a lecture, Q&A, interactive, etc?
- Participant take-aways—what will people learn from the presentation?

Title and Summarized Description 15 pts

Provide a title and short description of the workshop that will be used in conference registration materials.

- Title is limited to 15 words.
- Short description is limited to 50 words.

Alignment with Conference Focus Areas 5 pts

Describe how the presentation aligns with conference focus areas (described in detail on the next page).
